

PUPIL PREMIUM STATEMENT

Beacon Academy aims to provide opportunities for its students that enable them to play an active role in the twenty-first century. As a fully inclusive academy, students have full access to and experience of the curriculum regardless of race, class, gender, physical ability and religious belief. The Academy promotes a sense of self-esteem, responsibility and tolerance in young people. It values and challenges the individual so that they achieve the highest levels of attainment whatever their starting point.

The Pupil Premium is therefore a key resource for ensuring the realisation of this inclusive and aspirational ethos. The nature of the issue makes it essential that personalised rather than blanket support is provided for students. We recognise that not all students who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged or underachieving. We also recognise that not all students who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We therefore reserve the right to extend support for non-Pupil Premium students to provide access to additional intervention(s) to support any groups of pupils the academy has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.

The Pupil Premium Grant is paid to schools for students who are recorded as being eligible for Free School Meals in the last 6 years, who are Looked After or who have a parent serving in the armed forces.

Barriers to future attainment 2019/2020 (for pupils eligible for PP, including LA, MA and HA)

In-school barriers for the 2019/2020 cohort continue to exist in the priority focus areas for improvement. Those barriers are outlined below:

- 1. Attendance, punctuality and persistent absence.
- 2. Poor attitudes to learning in some key groups of disadvantaged pupils.
- 3. Engagement in all aspects of school activities including lessons, free flow times and extra- curricular opportunities of some key groups of disadvantaged pupils.

External barriers for the 2019/2020 cohort continue to exist in the priority focus areas for improvement. Those barriers are outlined below:

- 1. Levels of aspiration in some family homes are low.
- 2. Levels of literacy and numeracy of some students on entry to the school are lower than national average.
- 3. Extreme poverty: 48% of Beacon students live in some of the most deprived post code areas in the UK, low aspirations consistent with coastal community. A significant number of students in the Ks4 year groups who joined Beacon Academy following negative school experiences elsewhere.

Aims for the 2019/2020 Cohort

- 1. To 'diminish the difference' in variability between achievement of the disadvantaged group against peers in school and nationally.
- 2. To continue to reduce the level of fixed term exclusion of pupils in the disadvantaged cohort in line with the academy improvement priority (PP cohort vs. non-PP cohort). To maintain the academy's 0% permanent exclusion record for the next academic year in both cohorts.
- 3. To improve the attendance of the disadvantaged cohort to at least 95% in line with national and academy expectations.

Pupil Premium Budgeting 2019/2020

The amount of money Beacon Academy is estimated to receive in 2019/2020 is £196,350. The planned Pupil Premium expenditure for the 2019/2020 academic year is outlined below:
